After the initial presentations, breakout groups, and plenary sessions, colleagues in three dental specialties provided their interpretation of the future implementation of the cutting-edge science described in the Summit. Not only was the science stimulating, but the educational experience was designed to ensure that those in attendance would gain meaningful knowledge from the program.

As promised at the beginning of these comments, the fact that the Summit was witnessed by a small number of attendees is no cause for concern. That is because the proceedings of the meeting will be chronicled in a supplemental issue of JOMI to be published in January and mailed along with the January/February issue.
